### From NAACP President and CEO Derrick Johnson

We're less than one month away from the anniversary of the historic *Brown v. The Board of Education* decision – when the Supreme Court issued its seminal unanimous ruling outlawing segregation in our nation's public schools.

The ruling represented a transformative affirmation of racial equality and became a foundational principle of our legal system and our democracy.

Now, seven decades after the Little Rock Nine braved violent crowds with police escorts just to get a quality education, the state of Arkansas is passing an "anti-indoctrination" law to stop

African American Studies courses from being taught in public schools.

This legislation and discriminatory treatment of AP African American studies are an unconstitutional attempt to erode educational equity – so we sued the state of Arkansas to stop it!

Schools should be free of politics, bureaucracy, censorship, and draconian oversight of educators. Students should be allowed to learn about real history, not a whitewashed version. The most painful chapters of American history should not be buried because it makes some people uncomfortable.

The pursuit of equality in education requires constant vigilance; it represents one of our highest ideals and most cherished values. The NAACP is proud to take this fight to the courts and will continue to do everything in our power to advocate for equitable education – but we need your help to make it happen.
